Issue 1 To Discharge Epstein Transparency Bill from House Judiciary Committee

On Nov. 12, 2025, sponsors of the Epstein Files Transparency Act (HR 4405) reached the threshold of 218 signatures they needed for their bill to be discharged from the Judiciary Committee to the House floor for an up or down vote. The House and then the Senate passed the bill in late November and President Trump signed it into law on Nov. 19, 2025.

After Reps. Ro Khanna, D-Calif., and Thomas Massie, R-Ky, introduced the transparency act on July 15, 2025, it was shelved in the Judiciary Committee by Chairman Jim Jordan, R-Ohio.

All 214 House Democrats and four Republicans signed the petition. The decisive 218th signature was provided by newly elected Rep. Adelita Grijalva, D-Ariz., after Speaker Mike Johnson, R-La., had delayed her swearing in by several weeks with President Trump's approval. The four GOP members joining Democrats in signing the petition were Massie and Reps. Marjorie Taylor Greene of Georgia, Lauren Boebert of Colorado and Nancy Mace of South Carolina.

A yes signature was to discharge the Epstein Files Transparency Act from the House Judiciary Committee.

Issue 2 To Compel Trump Administration to Release Epstein Files

Voting 427 for and one against, the House on Nov. 18, 2025, passed the Epstein Files Transparency Act (HR 4405), which would require the Trump administration to publicly release within 30 days the hundreds of gigabytes of law-enforcement files stored at the Department of Justice and FBI on child rapist and global sex trafficker Jeffrey Epstein and his collaborators. The paper and electronic trove is comprised of millions of pages of emails and other correspondence between Epstein and members of his criminal ring; travel data including passenger logs of flights on his private jets; transcripts of FBI interviews of victims; contact books identifying traffickers; photos and videos of sexual acts; court documents; and Treasury Department and IRS records showing how Epstein financed his global operations.

The Senate passed the bill on a non-record vote on Nov. 19, 2025, and President Trump signed it into law the same day.

Law enforcement authorities assembled the files over decades of investigations that resulted in Epstein's plea deal in 2008 on state charges of soliciting prostitution from

a 14-year-old girl and his federal indictment in 2019 on charges of trafficking underage girls. He died Aug. 10, 2019, in a New York City jail while awaiting trial.

In floor debate on the bill, Rep. Jamie Raskin of Maryland, the top Democrat on the Judiciary Committee, said: "This forced vote means the House will no longer acquiesce in this astonishing real-time coverup of a multibillion-dollar global sex trafficking and child-rape ring that has ravaged the lives of more than a thousand girls and young women."

House Speaker Mike Johnson, R-La., said: "Democrats are using the Epstein tragedy...as a political weapon to try to distract from their failures as a party and to try their best to try to tie President Trump somehow into this wretched scandal. The president had nothing to do with it. He has been very clear. He has nothing to hide. That is why he endorsed the vote today."

A yes vote was to pass the Epstein Files Transparency Act.
