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NEW WEBSITE COVERS CAPITOL HILL ACTIONS ON THE EPSTEIN FILES

With the U.S. Congress now investigating the Jeffrey Epstein scandal after decades of virtually ignoring it, a new website puts an accountability spotlight on legislative actions concerning the serial child-rapist and his global sex-trafficking ring.

Launched in August 2026, US Congress VoteFacts.com is a constituent resource for tracking individual lawmakers' stands on the question of whether the massive collection of law-enforcement materials known as The Epstein Files should be publicly revealed.

The exclusive coverage on this public-access website is offered by no other digital or print news organization. Naming names, asserting facts and employing clear and concise prose, we provide voters back home with information for judging where their two senators and local representative stand on disclosure vs. secrecy and calling out lawmakers who misrepresent their record on Epstein-related issues.

In addition to reading the site on devices, constituents can download - and widely share - compact and colorful PDFs showing all House members' and senators' votes on The Epstein Files.

VoteFacts.com hopes that its followers will include the growing number of Epstein victims and survivors using in-person visits, press conferences and social media to implore members of Congress to deliver justice to their cause.

At present, the coverage consists of 13 Epstein-related votes in the full House and Senate and in House committees and subcommittees in 2025-2026 as well as House members' stands on a discharge petition to send a transparency bill to a vote on the House floor. The site also covers Senate votes in 2017 on confirming a cabinet secretary with links to Epstein.

Thomas Voting Reports, Inc., the parent organization of VoteFacts.com, was the longest-running independent news service in Washington between July 1973 and June 2021, serving a subscriber base of more than 700 print and digital news outlets over five decades. We restored the news service in 2026 to cover the expanding Epstein story from a congressional-accountability angle that other media were not reporting. The coverage will be updated through Election Day 2026 and beyond.
